Last month the Northern
Edge News ran a couple
of articles about the potential
risks associated with skating on the City's frozen storm
ponds in our areas. Those articles resulted in a wide range of
immediate and direct feedback
from residents... both for and
against the article and its message. Some thought it to be an
overreaction and unnecessary
while others thanked us for

and explaining why the ponds could be dangerous.

Regardless of your personal views on the subject, one common theme came forward: the northern hills has a dearth of recreational facilities and in particular a need for places for people to have a recreational skate or a friendly game of

The feedback only confirmed that the NHCA is on the right track with our fledgling plans to try and address this issue by developing and implementing safe and accessible recreational skating areas within our communities.

shinny with friends or family.

We have identified four candidate locations for skating rinks in the northern hills neighbourhoods. Four locations are proposed: one each in Harvest Hills, Country Hills, Panorama Hills and Coventry Hills. Adopt-a-rinks are skating rinks that are bounded with soil berms that can be implemented and maintained with relatively little effort provided there is a nearby winter water source at each location. Current plans are to install the first adopt-a-rink in Coventry with the other locations being developed at later dates.

So, what are our plans for bringing these recreational facilities to reality? Well, there is some good news: the NHCA has identified appropriate parcels of land for each proposed venture and we might also be able to provide some seed money to get the adopt-a-rinks going. The challenging news is that we will need resources and additional capital to develop more detailed plans, work with approving authorities, organize Continued on page 5



COVENTRY WET POND

he Coventry wet pond or Country Village wet pond is located behind Cardel Place.

Did you know there is a homeowners association responsible for the pathway system around the pond?

The homeowners association is the Country Hills Town Centre Shoreline Association (Shoreline Association). All owners within the 11 condo complexes between the pond and Coventry Hills Blvd NE, Country Village Rd NE and Country Village Way NE are members. The annual \$105 fee is embedded in the condo fees for these 1,500+ condos. The fees, plus City contributions, pay for the maintenance, upkeep and upgrades to landscaping and amenities around most of the pond. (The City is responsible for the lands behind Cardel Place and Notre Dame High School. The shopping centre is responsible for their gazebo and tree area.) WHAT SHORELINE AS-SOCIATION FEES HAVE PAID FOR

In 2010 overhead pathway lighting was installed along the east and north portion of the pond. Phase II of the lighting project is anticipated for 2011 along the west side to complete the project. Fees have also paid for upgrades such as additional benches and garbage bins, replacement of shrubs and trees, ongoing graffiti removal and snow clearing.

SHORELINE ASSOCIA-TION AGM - MARCH 31st at 7 pm





Second Phase of High Performance Modular Classrooms for Panorama Hills Middle School

PARTNERSHIP

B^{2L} Partnership (B2L stands for Build to Learn) is the industry consortium chosen by

the Government of Alberta to build 10 new schools in the province. Construction on the Panorama Hills Middle School has been in high gear since late September 2010. The first phase of high performance modular classrooms are now on site (eight of twelve) and the steel structure of the school is currently being erected.

The final four high performance modular classrooms will be delivered to the site in mid to late February 2011. Similar to the delivery of the first phase, residents may experience some minor traffic delays as large equipment and slow moving vehicles with wide loads pass through the neighborhood to the school site. B2L Partnership will ensure that there are few inconveniences to residents and business owners. All high performance modular classrooms have been delivered to the Coventry Hills

Middle School site as well so with this stage of construction complete, there will be no fur-

ther disruptions of this nature to the Northern Hills communities.



READ WEEK February 20-26

Although the ability to choose our own reading material is a value that we cherish, books have been challenged and sometimes banned throughout history. The works of Shakespeare and the Bible were once banned as well as many other books from ancient times right up to the present. Here are just a few examples.

35 A D: The Roman Emperor Caligula opposed the reading of The Odyssey by Homer, written more than 300 years before. He thought the epic poem was dangerous because it expressed Greek ideas of freedom.

1597: The original version of Shakespeare's Richard II contained a scene in which the king was deposed from his throne. Queen Elizabeth I was so angry that she ordered the scene removed from all copies of the play.

1881: Walt Whitman's Leaves of Grass (published in 1833) was threatened with banning by Boston's district attorney unless the book was expurgated. The public uproar brought such sales of his books that Whitman was able to buy a house with the proceeds.

1954: Mickey Mouse comics were banned in East Berlin because Mickey was said to be an "anti-Red rebel."

1980s: During its examination of school learning materials, the London County Council in England banned the use of Beatrix Potter's children's classics The Tale of Peter Rabbit and Benjamin Bunny from all London schools. The reason: the stories portrayed only "middle-class rabbits."

Trees! Glorious Trees!

his year, the City will provide ten communities in Calgary with trees as partners in the NeighborWoods program of Urban Forest repair and replenishment. For 2011 the city has selected the Northern Hills communities to be a part of the program, which was developed to add more trees on residential streets, add aesthetic appeal, improve property values, and provide other benefits to neighbourhoods.

Under the program, residents may apply for trees to be planted on city property in front of, or adjacent to, their homes. This is a one-time offer from the city to help us repair and extend the

urban forest in our communities and for individual residents to promote and participate in meaningful community-based environmental stewardship.

Residents simply call 3-1-1 to make arrangements with the city for a tree to be planted in front of their home. This is a volunteer based program and the Northern Hills Community Association (NHCA) has agreed to help with promotion through our newsletter and a door to door campaign across our communities. We only need to provide the volunteers to get the word out in our area.

This is an exceptional opportunity for the Northern Hills communities to add significant

urban forest and plant life to our neighbourhoods at a very low cost. We are looking for residents to help make this important initiative a resounding success. The NHCA will provide support to help advertise the program and get the initiative organized and underway. The rest is up to individual residents.

Protect your home by protecting your blue cart

he City of Calgary's household recycling program uses large, wheeled blue carts for weekly recycling material pick-up. These can contain easily combustible materials such as paper and cardboard, along with potentially valuable items such as refundable containers and documents with your personal information.

The Calgary Police Service offers these tips to keep your blue cart — and your home — from becoming a target for vandals or thieves.

Keep your blue cart in your garage or out of sight within your yard whenever it's not out for recycling pickup. Leaving it in the alley or on your driveway can make your cart a target for graffiti, arson or damage by vehicles.

Take refundable containers such as pop cans to bottle depots. If these containers are left in blue carts, they encourage people to go through the blue cart contents, which can lead to littering and vandalism.

If you don't find recycling depots convenient, you may also consider donating your refundable containers to local bottle drives, or simply dropping the containers off at a bottle depot. Many depots have a bin for donations and the money collected goes to charitable organizations.

Don't put hazardous materials such as solvents or batteries in your blue cart, as these can endanger City staff and damage equipment during recycling pickup and processing. For a convenient list of blue cart materials, and options for non-recyclable material, check The City of Calgary website at www.calgary.ca or call 3-1-1.

Shred all documents that contain personal information such as bills, bank statements, receipts, etc, and place them in a clear plastic bag before disposing of them in your blue cart.

If your blue cart is vandalized, please report it to the Calgary Police Service using the nonemergency phone number: 403-266-1234. This helps the police establish patterns of crime, which in turn helps create solutions.

Let your neighbours know if your blue cart has been vandalized, so they can take precautions to protect their blue carts.

If you see a blue cart being vandalized, report it as a crime in progress to 9-1-1.

realize that this year has started with a storm and many of the people experienced a problem with the drifting snow at their home, neighbourhood and community. Snow Fences were put up on 80th Ave. between 52nd St. and 60th St. N. E. But for many of the areas

that were approved it was too late in the year and the ground was frozen so they were unable to be installed. The ploughing of the city streets has to follow a policy of the top priorities that are to be done first and to work down the list. This year the city responded to your call for assistance and has hired contractors to help with the clean up. We should give thanks to the Roads Dept. who were proactive and kept a list of the hot spots, so this year they were able to react in a timely fashion.

In answer to my Notice of Motion, Council directed Administration to investigate the appropriate locations and land use districts for Large Places of Worship and report back to City Council with recommended amendments to Bylaw 1P2007, through Calgary Planning Commission no later than Sept.

Many of you may have noticed the increase number of cell towers that are springing up in your communities and this has caused a few issues. They are a necessity for the use of cell phones and other wireless communication devices and therefore a large number are required to guarantee uninterrupted communication. The communication companies send out notices, to adjacent land owners, with a time limit, so they can comment on the towers before they are approved.

The City of Calgary can comment, but we are NOT the approving Authority for these structures. The federal Minister of Industry is the approving authority for telecommunication antenna structures and devices under the Radiocommunication Act.

By the time you read this we should have a decision on the future of the Airport Tunnel project. It is scheduled to come to Council for a decision on Jan. 24th.

Calgarians Embrace Cats in Need during Feline Frenzy at Animal Services

Animal & Bylaw Services' adoption promotion, Feline Frenzy, brought forth many generous and compassionate Calgarians, willing to open their homes and their hearts to cats in need of loving, forever homes. Between Nov. 29 and Dec. 12, 2010, 65 fantastic felines left the Animal Services Centre with their new adoptive families. Amazed, the staff at the Animal Services Centre watched as happy cat after happy cat was carried out the door. Again and again we heard Calgarians exclaim that the Animal Services Centre was a beautiful facility, but should not be a long term home for an animal. Many of the new cat owners were simply not aware that Animal Services had pets available for adoption.

"It was fantastic to be a part of the event," declared one member of the shelter staff, "Seeing so many cats, some of which had been with us for over six months, out of their kennels and in to proper, loving homes was simply astounding!"

Animal & Bylaw Services, along with Humane Societies and Animal Services organizations nationwide, have made 2011 the Year of the Cat. It is a whole year dedicated to raising awareness of the plight of these beautiful creatures. In contrast to their canine counterparts, cats end up sitting in shelters because their owners do not licence or provide

their cats with permanent identification. Often, cats have been allowed to roam in their communities. Likewise, the owners of lost or stray cats often don't bother to search for their lost cat. Cats simply seem to be valued less than dogs in our society.

Calgarians have already made many positive strides towards responsible cat ownership. Cat licensing became mandatory in Calgary in 2006 under the Responsible Pet Ownership Bylaw. We currently boast close to a 50% compliance rate in regards to cat licensing. Not only does this high level of licensing allow Animal & Bylaw Services to possess one of the highest return-to-owner rates and lowest euthanization rates for shelters in North America, but licensing fees, not tax dollars, allow us to provide key services to Calgarians. The No Cost Spay/Neuter program for low income Calgarians, the operation of the Animal Services Centre clinic, education programs and the Drive Home program are just some of the fantastic programs that pet licensing fees help to

Calgarians are definitely on the right track, but there is always room for improvement. In celebration of the Year of the Cat, let's work together to keep cats out of the shelters in Calgary.

Hemp Hearts - Nature's Power Food

uman tissue requires nour-ishment every morning with slow digesting proteins, omega fats and raw, long fiber foods containing vitamins and enzymes. These are essential nutrients, unlike the starch, sugar and blended processed foods that most people eat without a second

Those who consume most of their essential nutrients each morning have all day to utilize any possible excess, and can control weight easily.



Management Review of Off-leash Dog Areas

The City of Calgary is reviewing its policies regarding off-leash dog parks through an Off-leash Area Management Plan. Digital signs rules

As directed by Calgary Planning Commission in the spring, and after three consultations since August, City staff are close to completing Land Use Bylaw rules for "digital" signs (present rules do not effectively address these signs). This will affect third-party and regular commercial signs, also digital signs that might be put on community buildings, etc. We anticipate the proposal at CPC in December and Council tentatively February 7. A number of communities have expressed concerns about proliferation and location of digital signs. Some are also interested in employing them on their own buildings. This work is happening in advance of a more comprehensive review of sign policies generally, which is anticipated to next year. If you are interested in this or want more info please get in touch with NHCA or Federation of Calgary Communities.

Updates to the Community Guide to the Planning Process

We have completed updates to this useful Guide. They are now posted on the website - linked from the Planning page. You can print the changes and insert them into your binder, and copies will be available at the office and at PIP courses. If you come in the office, bring in your old binder so we can swap it with a new one. Some of the changes include a description of the new Municipal Development Plan ("Plan It"), and how it fits into planning decision-making on applications. We have also added some timely planning issues such as community gardens, special care facilities and good neighbour agreements, and surplus school sites.

Multi-residential changes to Council in New Year

Changes to multi-residential districts previously

reported passed at CPC and will go to City Council for a public hearing in January 10. Communities who were consulted and the Federation were generally supportive of the changes. For information, contact the Federation.




