He is a real caretaker of the block in many ways. You may see him out there mowing lawns well down the block because he cares enough to help make his neighbourhood a better place to live.

The neighbour on the corner of the gate has allowed us to use her water supply to keep our plants looking healthy for the past two years.

When the gate was victimized by a hit and run driver, Dale and Doran answered the call to pull out the crumpled gate and posts and haul them away to the dump.

A cast of dedicated gardeners have shopped for, trans-

ported, planted, weeded and watered those tender annuals and perennials. This dedication is now in its third season. To name only a few, Marg, Maureen, Wendy, Deanna, Joanne, Emily and so many others have shown real "dig in there" attitudes!

So if making your community a more beautiful place to live, and meeting your awesome neighbours, ing property values appeals to you,

## **Second Annual Harvest Moon Dance**

alling All Killer Dillers, Cake Walkers, and Lindy Hoppers! The Second Annual Northern Hills Community Association (NHCA) Harvest Moon Dance and Fundraiser is coming your way and we are looking for all you hep cats and jazz daddies to step out for an evening of jiving good fun. Last year was such a rousing success that we decided to have it again... with a few small changes to make it more fun. Now, if you aren't familiar with our theme, the Harvest Moon Dance, let me provide a quick history lesson\*:

The Harvest Moon Dance theme is based on the Harvest Moon Ball, which was an annual amateur dance contest sponsored by the New York Daily News and held each August or September in New York City from 1927 to 1989. Preliminary competitions and contests were held in various venues and ballrooms around the city culminating in the finals at Madison Square Gardens (from 1935 to 1974).

The contest was mainly



known for the Lindy Hop division but also included other dances such as the Rumba, Foxtrot, Polka, Tango, Collegiate Shag, Viennese Waltz, a Serviceman's Division, and later even the Hustle. There was an "All Round Champions" prize awarded but the Lindy Hop division (later called the Jitterbug Jive division, and then the Rock 'n Roll division) was generally the most spectacular and particularly popular with audiences and press.

Preliminary rounds began in August and led up to the finals in Madison Square Gardens where the 20,000 seats would typically sell out

within days of going on sale. Big name celebrities and famous Hollywood actors often attended and Ed Sullivan was the emcee in the early days.

Now, the NHCA liked the theme but once again there won't be a dance contest (at least not this year). We wanted to focus on having fun and maybe raising some money for our much needed programs, activities, and initiatives. But that doesn't mean there won't be dancing and frolicking and all of that good stuff. There will be contemporary music and live and silent auctions to get the event out of the gate properly. There will be food and jumping and jiving and flinging and singing and... well you get the picture.

So, mark October 14 on your calendar as the date where you take your best girl (or guy) to the Second Annual NHCA Harvest Moon Dance and Fundraiser for a swinging good time!

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



The Community Association and I share your concerns. For the last couple of years the Association has designated some of the budget to cleaning up and planting flowers on a few of the corners in our neighbourhoods. We have a small group of volunteers dedicated to the task. The upkeep of the boulevards and green spaces in our area is the responsibility of the city. I am not sure what has happened in the last few years but it would appear that the city cannot keep up with the amount of work that needs to be done.

Some new communities and certain areas of older communities have a Homeowners Association, such as the one you are referring to in Klncora, where a private contractor is hired to maintain the green spaces and annual fees are

collected from the residents. We (the NHCA) have spoken to our Alderman many times regarding the crumbling gate areas and weedy green spaces. We may have to attempt to put this type of structure in place, although it may be difficult to get the support from the residents.

For now, please call 311 and complain. You can also call 311 and complain about specific homeowners who do not keep up the maintenance and bylaws will enforce. We have contacted Alderman Stevenson's office on your behalf. Perhaps they have some ideas for us.

# Community, Development, Recreation... Oh My!

Recently Cardel Place asked the NHCA to help them lobby City Hall for funding of their proposed expansion plans. And this set us all to thinking... and debating... and more thinking and debating... etc. In the end we did provide a letter of our support with some stipulations to encourage positive dialogue and broader community development. We thought it appropriate to try and explain why what some might think would be a "no brainer" endorsement could be viewed by some people as cautious support.

Community – it can be as evident and widespread as the internet or as modest and intimate as holding hands but in all cases is really about developing a sense of responsibility for the area in which we live. And, if you ask 100 different people what community means to them they will provide 100 different responses, particularly in a community with the size and complexity of issues as the Northern Hills. Just trying to consider all of the benefits and impacts, let alone how a development of this magnitude would stack up against the other important issues in our communities, becomes a monumental task for anyone to undertake.

Cardel Place is a first-class and successful recreation facility and a valuable asset for our community. Yet, in trying to provide a response to this request we needed to consider some key aspects of the proposed development, which is understood to be still in the concept development stage: how does the expansion fit with the community vision; what are the specific benefits and impacts of this proposal; and what is its relative importance when compared to other issues facing our neighbourhoods. That is – Does it fit? Is it good for us? Does it address a priority issue?

For example, during the initial planning of our neighbourhoods, the

land immediately east of Cardel Place (currently vacant) was set aside for a public school. Some of us thought it would be a perfect location for a high school until recently the Calgary Board of Education (CBE) decided that a high school won't be built in the Northern Hills anytime soon, if ever. It seemed to us that a high school at that location would have resulted in all kinds of synergies between the two facilities and would have shown real knock-on benefits to the community. So, now as we bus kids out of our neighbourhoods to attend school, Cardel Place would like to expand and attract users back into our communities all the while increasing the time people spend in vehicles and the traffic loads on our streets.

Don't get us wrong. We support Cardel's funding lobby and a proposed expansion on the understanding that it makes sense and will provide strategic opportunities to build our community. Yet, in the broader context of community we see the NHCA as being uniquely positioned to help sort out how such proposals can find that broader strategic benefit for community development within the Northern Hills.

Our communities have many needs and expanding our recreation capacity is likely one of them. However, we are also in dire need of a public high school, effective community advocacy, community gardens, outdoor skating areas, acute and extended care facilities, well-maintained parks, relief from choking traffic, new noise walls, baseball diamonds and soccer fields, and so on and so on and so on. We wish to pursue opportunities that make sense and add real benefits for our community – Does it fit? Are there benefits? Is it one of our priorities? Cardel Place and the NHCA would like to know your thoughts...

# **City Committed to Catching up** on Parks Maintenance Delays

#### **BACKGROUND**

The City of Calgary works to ensure proper maintenance of City parks and other open spaces. When weather conditions create wet grass, City crews are unable to mow. A late spring combined with wet weather conditions have caused a delay in mowing of playfields and parks this year. City crews are working additional shifts as weather allows to catch up on these delays.

#### **KEY MESSAGES**

As of today, Parks crews are almost four weeks behind in mowing schedules due to weather.

- To make up for this lost time, additional shifts and scheduling have been activated to ensure parks, playfields and open spaces are mowed as soon as possible. Additionally, contracted crews are being called in where available.
- If weather improves and drier conditions prevail, we anticipate crews to be caught up on mowing activities in approximately

two weeks time.

- The City of Calgary is committed to maintaining public spaces and creating a safe environment for Calgarians.
- We know that parks and playfield conditions have not been in optimal condition this spring as a result of the wet and rainy season. We thank the public for their understanding as we work hard to overcome the weather challenges we've experienced as quickly and as best we can.

#### **NEXT STEPS**

What is The City doing to catch up on maintenance activities that have been delayed by weather?

Additional shifts and scheduling have been activated and contractors are being brought in where available to ensure mowing occurs as soon as possible. As well, Parks crews are shifting equipment between districts wherever possible in order to help build capacity and get the parks and open spaces looking beautiful for Calgarians once again.

How far behind are we?

Mowing schedules are almost four weeks behind due to weather delays. If weather improves and drier conditions prevail, crews should be caught up on mowing activities in about two weeks. This work has already begun, and will continue as weather allows.

How does this affect dandelions?

Weather conditions have also caused a delay in the application of herbicides to control dandelions and other weeds. Dandelions are expected to be past the flowering period by the end of June. Accordingly, while there may be some areas in the city where dandelions will still flower, the majority will be dormant in coming weeks.

Note - 4 of the 7 break and enter crimes in Panorama Hills were into some parking garage storage lockers at a single condominium development. Generally speaking, the Northern Hills is a great place to live and work and raise a family. And the NHCA wants to keep it that way by working closely with our community police representatives. The purpose of providing monthly reports on crime statistics and information is to increase awareness and

hopefully help the CSP make our neighborhoods safer. We meet regularly with Community Liaison Officers (CLO's) for our area to review these statistics, to discuss issues and trends regarding crime in our communities and to identify ways that the NHCA can help the CPS in their work.

Remember, if you are victim of a crime or if you are a witness to a crime, no matter how big or small, please report it to

the police service as soon as it is safe to do so. The more information that the police have to work with the more likely they will be able to solve the crime and apprehend the person or persons responsible.

# Staying safe at home

# **Vacation-proof your home**

n empty home can be an An empty nome season the easy target for thieves. The **Calgary Police Service suggests** the following quick and easy tips to protect your home and valuables when you leave your home for an extended period of time:

Make your home look lived in: Put lights, radios and TVs on variable timers. Have someone stay inside your home for a while each day if possible. If you're leaving a vehicle outside your house, have someone move its position periodically, to make it appear as if it is being used. Also arrange for lawn and garden upkeep.

**Cancel deliveries:** Either cancel newspapers, mail and other delivery items or have a trusted neighbour collect them for you while you are away.

Look at your home through a burglar's eyes: Ensure the exterior of your home is well-lit and that burglars don't have an opportunity to work unseen in hidden areas, such as behind

fences or bushes.

Check the fine print: Read your home insurance policy to find out how often your home needs to be checked in order to maintain your coverage, especially during the winter heating season. In some cases, the requirement may be for daily checks.

Trust carefully: Tell only people you trust that you will be away and how long you will be gone for. Leave an itinerary with them so that they can reach you in case of an emergency. Ask trusted neighbours to collect junk mail and look out for your place; if there's no one nearby, hire a reliable house-sitting service.

**Go off site:** Store important or irreplaceable documents and items away from your home, such as in a safety deposit box.

Secure your garage: Disconnect the garage door opener by switching on its "lock" setting or switching off the circuit breaker that allows the automatic door to

open. Place a padlock in the door track to block the roller. Lock all person-doors, including the one between an attached garage and the house.

Before you go: Lock up tools, BBQs and ladders and make sure they are out of sight; set and test your timers; lock and check doors and windows; and leave shades and blinds in normal positions. Turn off the telephone ringer so no one knows your home is empty (and don't leave outgoing phone or email messages saying you are away).

If you return to find that your home has been broken into, don't enter it and don't touch anything. Call police at 403-266-1234 from a neighbour's home or cell phone, and wait for help

# An adventure in composting...

n Sunday, June 12, the community gardeners of the Northern Hills were lucky to have an expert on composting come and share come valuable information with us. In essence lifting us out of the inactive compost club (basically we were piling up garden waste with nothing happening) and ushering us into the composting elite (or at least capable, in theory). Bert, with a varied resume of composting experience from a multitude of community gardens and other sources cannot be thanked enough. I have a feeling that if one was to map out all the composting done in Calgary he would have had a hand in most of it at some stage.

In all we spent an hour or so delving into the magic of bacteria and other critters recycling our organic wastes. It really is quite amazing what microorganisms can do. Here are some tidbits that I can remember (sorry I'm not one for taking notes):

• try and mix equal parts browns and greens by weight (browns are dried leaves, newspaper, paper egg cartons; greens are your grass and veg-

 because greens are mostly water when you add them to compost the final mixture ends up

being 20 parts browns to 1 part greens once everything has dried and started to mix

• if your compost is starting to smell it is probably too wet and needs to be turned, also add some browns

 if nothing is happening and you are getting pest infestation (ants, wasps, mice) your pile is probably too dry; add water and turn

 if you have a large enough compost pile and it is working properly it will cook some bad things out of the soil (like seeds from weeds); but to be sure you can put your weeds and their seeds in a sealed black garbage bag out in direct sun for 3 days (driveway works well) this will definitely cook those nasty weed seeds

 if you don't get oxygen to the microorganisms that are doing all the work by turning your compost and not over watering the process turns anaerobic and starts producing greenhouse gas bi-products, much like a landfill (best to keep it aerobic and turn your compost when it needs it

 a working compost pile will create temperatures from 30-50 degrees Celsius (I'd recommend gloves)

And of course what would a day at the garden be without a lovely picture (thanks Paul for being our photographer). Ohhhhhh... and also it rained just as we were finishing up so we didn't have a chance to implement any of our new tricks on our pile in waiting, however next weekend our compost pile will be propelled into action by all of us new compost apprentices.

In response to public concerns about pesticide use, The City only uses pesticides when predefined weed density thresholds are met and infestations threaten the long-term health of the

landscape. The weather is also a factor in weed control, with the amount of rain that fell in the spring it prevented the city from cutting the areas or spraying when it was the best time.

# **Transportation Fees Update**

he Board of Trustees used a balanced approach when deciding on transportation fees for the coming school year. To close the \$8.8 million gap between the provincial transportation grant and the actual cost of getting students to and from school the Board decided to increase user fees as well as continuing to subsidize student transportation with funds that could be used for instructional purposes.

The family maximum for transportation fees, which was \$40 per month for the current school year, was eliminated. Parents of eligible students experiencing financial difficulties and who meet provincial income guidelines may apply for a waiver of the transportation fee(s). This application is available at your child's school or on the CBE website at: www.cbe.ab.ca/parents/forms.asp

Trustees recognize that fee increases can be difficult for families. However, our Mega End is that each student will complete high school with a foundation of learning to function effectively in life, work and continued learning. In order to realize our Ends (Mega End, Academic Success, Citizenship, Personal Development and Character) we need to ensure that as much money as possible is being used for instructional purposes.

The transportation of about 31,000 students throughout Calgary is extremely complex. The Board of Trustees continues to ask the provincial government for a new metro funding framework that would meet the needs of our students and reduce the financial burden on families.



Your tidy property may motivate your neighbours to keep their own property tidy resulting in a cleaner, nicer and safer neighbourhood with possible increased property values.

<u>Tidy properties make business sense.</u>

Consumers and visitors are attracted by beautiful, clean and safe properties and neighbourhoods.

By keeping your property tidy, you are breaking or even stopping the potential cycle of vandalism and violence in your neighbourhood. The Broken Window Theory states that maintaining urban environments in a well-ordered condition may prevent vandalism as well as an escalation into more serious crimes.

An untidy property often attracts insects, mice and/or coyotes. By keeping your property tidy, you are protecting yourself, your pets and your property from unwanted visitors and the negative impacts of their

By keeping your property tidy, you are also protecting the environment.

#### What does a tidy property look like?

- Hedges, trees and shrubs are trimmed so they don't interfere with pedestrians and vehicles using the sidewalks and roads
- Grass and herbaceous plants are kept under 15 cm tall.
  - Weeds are under control.
- Any material stored in the yard must not be visible from outside of the property.
- Only an appropriate amount of materials for the current building project is stacked in an orderly and safe manner.

✓ Animal feces are picked up.

- There are no unpleasant odours emanating from the property.
- ✓ There is no dust, smoke or materials escaping from the property.
  - ✔ All buildings and structures are in good repair.


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
