


needed reusable items to our City's

EDITORIAL

More on Schools (and taxes)

You may have heard that the Calgary Board of Education recently released a new fee schedule based on consulting with the community. I participated in a survey and found the questions were asked in a way that didn't seem to consider communities without schools and did not require transportation. For example, the second question of the survey asks if children attend their designated community school? Since many communities in Calgary do not have designated schools, including the Northern Hills, I would like to believe the intent of the question may have been enquiring about the school designated for a particular community. Many of our residents choose alternative programming for schools for a variety of reasons. For me personally, I would not have considered an alternative program if schools had been available in my community. When I realized my children were going to bus to Renfrew for middle school, I started looking at my options and chose a different program only a few blocks further. Regardless of what school you choose for grades 5-9, our kids must bus, and must have lunchtime supervision, and must have lunchtime activities. We as parents, and as a community, have not created this situation. It is entirely the responsibility of a lack of schools. But the lack of schools, has burdened us with these fees.

The next question that stood out to me asked if a parent should pay additional fees, if there are any, for a child to attend a program of personal choice. However, the survey does not address the reasons a person might make these personal choices such as perceived better education in the Science Program or Traditional Learning Centre, or special needs such as the Sports program for a training athlete. It also does not consider that some of these alternative programs may actually be a shorter or equal travel distance than the designated school. About 4 questions later,



the question specifically states that there is increased transportation costs associated with alternative programs. I find this very misleading since both Coventry Hills and Panorama Hills each fill a bus that goes to the Science School and Alice Jamieson Girls Academy. I believe the Traditional Learning Centre also fills a bus. Since there is no middle school, these kids would have to bus to a school either way.

The survey next asks a variety of questions regarding fees and who should pay for them. For example: "The provincial government's funding formula does not provide for additional funding for the increased transportation cost associated with alternative programs. Should the transportation fees for students who attend alternative schools be:" However, the answer choices do not consider that many of us bus our children due to the lack of schools. I do not understand why a Grade 6 student and Grade 9 student riding the SAME bus, pay different fees.

Currently, transportation fees likely impact our community the most. This year it would cost \$625 in bus fees to send a Grade 6 and Grade 9 student to school that communities with schools didn't have to pay. Last year it was only \$400 and the year before that, it was \$330. I chose Grades 6 and 9 as they are both middle school grades that attend to the same school and ride the same bus from Coventry Hills,

and yet the transportation fee was different for each grade. How much sense does that make?

The Provincial Government has promoted reducing the mill rate on education taxes for 18 consecutive years, but transportation fees have increased over 100% in 2 years, impacting our community more than many others. Property taxes can be a complex issue as our values have fluctuated so much the past 5 years. However, a look at a Coventry Hills tax bill for 2010 showed Provincial Property tax for education at \$961.50 for a home assessed at \$351,500, but that home would have also paid \$400 in transportation fees for 2 kids, total \$1361.50. Simple math means that this homeowner essentially paid an additional 42% in education taxes if they had 2 kids busing to school. That is some user fee at a time education taxes were reduced.

In 2011, when the Alberta Government promoted an 8% reduction in taxes, that same property, with an assessment of \$380,500, saw Provincial Property Tax reduced to \$937.36, a reality of only 2.5%. You might recall, this was due to the City of Calgary electing to keep the difference. However, transportation fees increased to \$630 for those same 2 kids for a total of \$1567.36. The reality is that for this Coventry homeowner, education costs (taxes) increased by 15% over the previous year, or 67% higher than a community that has schools and doesn't need to bus! In fairness, once the middle schools open in Coventry and Panorama next year, this will fortunately change. At the very least, shouldn't bus fees and school fees be tax deductible?

This is a topic that could continue for pages. It is my hope that you have been provided with enough information to STEP UP, SPEAK UP, and SIGN UP. Join the NHCA, and contact MLA Woo-Paw and CBE Trustee Lynn Ferguson to ask for more schools and provide feedback on the new fee structure.







Keep Marijuana Grow Ops Out of Your Neighbourhood

etting to know your neighbours could help decrease crime in your community. Marijuana growing operations (MGOs) depend on anonymity. They move into communities quickly and quietly, hoping to

go unnoticed. They are not interested in waving across the fence or borrowing a cup of sugar.

Ward 4 residents have raised concerns about the number of MGOs in their communities. MGOs are a serious safety hazard that put people and neigh-

bourhoods across the city at risk. I recently met with residents of Edgemont to discuss strategies for eradicating MGOs and preventing them from taking root in our communities.

Preventing MGOs from establishing themselves in your neighbourhood requires individual and community action. Houses with MGOs often appear uninhabited or have unusual visitor behaviour. Covered windows, signs of condensation, odours, and power surges could all be indicators of an MGO. Pay attention to your neighbourhood surroundings.

The best way to eradicate MGOs is to report

suspicious activities to the Calgary Police Services Drug Tip Line at 403-428-8100. They will investigate and take appropriate action.

And don't forget about the importance of getting to know your neighbours. You can start with a friendly "hello" over the fence. It's that easy to establish a relationship, contribute to crime prevention and build a community network. You may also make new friends.



We meet regularly with Community Liaison Officers (CLO's) for our area to review these statistics, to discuss issues and trends regarding crime in our communities, and to identify ways that the NHCA can help the CPS in their work. Residents can contact the CLO's for our area at the District 7 office if they have any questions or concerns.

In addition to reporting crimes directly to the police, residents can also contact Crime Stoppers anonymously by telephone, web tip, or text message. If the information leads to an arrest, the caller may qualify for a reward. Remember, if you are the victim of a crime or if you are a witness to a crime, no matter how big or small, please report it to the police service as soon as it is safe to do so. The more information that the police have to work with the more likely they will be able to solve the crime and apprehend the person or persons responsible.






Group activities and events will all be posted on the 20-Minute Makeover website, so if you'd like to be part of a group event, watch the site for a location near

With warmer weather just around the corner, many Calgarians are busy planning summer getaways. It is important to include property maintenance on your vacation 'to-do' list in order to ensure bylaw compliance and the safety of your property by making your home look "lived in" while you are away.

- Ensure your yard is maintained by having your landscaping tended to by a neighbour or lawn care service.
- Before you leave, trim tree branches that may cause obstructions or reduce visibility of activities occurring on your property.
- Stop mail and newspaper deliveries or have them regularly picked up by a neighbour. Piles of papers or flyers may alert potential burglars to your absence and can also cause unnecessary litter in your community if left to blow away.
- Arrange for a house sitter or someone to check your property regularly. This will help to prevent crimes of opportunity, such as graffiti or break-ins.

Be sure to check with your home insurance company prior to your vacation. Many insurance companies have a number of requirements about how homes should be looked after while you are away.

By ensuring your property is taken care of while you are away, you can relax and enjoy your vacation knowing you have done your part to promote safer communities.


